

A New China Policy: Some Quaker Proposals

In this report, prepared for the American Friends Service Committee, the problems which contribute to the wall of "mutual hostility" between the U.S. and Communist China are discussed and new policy approaches, rooted "in ethical and human values," are suggested to help repair those divisions.

Sons of Abraham

James Kritzeck. Holicon. 126 pp. \$3.50.

Mr. Kritzeck, a specialist in the languages and literature of the Middle East, discusses the origins of Judaism, Christianity and Islam and the kinship of the three based upon a common patri-mony. He suggests that despite wide differences there is renewed hope for a three-fold dialogue among these sons of Abraham.

Africa: A Political Travelogue

Thomas Molnar. Fleet. 304 pp. \$6.95.

This most recent book by the author of *The Two Faces of American Foreign Policy* is based upon a trip through Northern and sub-Saharan Africa in 1963-64. Dr. Molnar is particularly inter-

ested in communism's inroads on the continent and in the extent to which "black Africa [will] be able to build and preserve the kind of modern state the new leaders and their followers are determined to have."

Vietnam and Beyond

Don R. Larson & Arthur Larson. Rule of Law Research Center. 42 pp. 50 cents.

This very current pamphlet calls for a policy of "selective containment" to replace the policy of "massive containment" of communism to which successive American administrations have subscribed. The authors examine closely the nature of the U.S. commitment in Vietnam and suggest steps for a "Way Out—With Honor."

Communism, Christianity and Democracy

Surjit Singh. John Knox. 127 pp. \$3.00.

The failure of Christianity in practice has historically given rise to Marxism-Leninism and liberal democracy, writes Prof. Singh of the San Francisco Theological Seminary faculty. He traces the growth of these competing worldviews from their Christian beginnings and assesses the future role of the churches in the USSR and in the Western democratic states.

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
